



CUMULATIVE PRECIPITATION WATER YEAR 2006

COLUMBIA BASIN ABOVE GRAND COULEE




SNAKE RIVER BASIN ABOVE ICE HARBOR

ABOVE NORMAL TEMPERATURES AND NEAR NORMAL PRECIPITATION IN MARCH

The blocking pattern that prevailed across the Pacific Northwest during the latter part of February continued into early March. Much drier and warmer than normal conditions prevailed. Late in the month, the blocking pattern finally broke down, which allowed a series of Pacific storm systems to move across the region. A strong storm system that impacted the region from the 26th to the 28th helped to boost monthly precipitation to near normal.

Precipitation Summary

March precipitation was: 115 percent of normal (1971-2000) at Columbia above Coulee, 108 percent of normal at the Snake River above Ice Harbor, and 109 percent of normal at Columbia above the Dalles.

Seasonal (October through March) precipitation was: 82 percent of normal(1971-2000) at Columbia above Coulee, 79 percent of normal at the Snake River above Ice Harbor, and 75 percent of normal at Columbia above the Dalles.

Daily precipitation records broken in March included 0.21 inches at Wenatchee on the 19th, 1.23 inches at Astoria on the 20th, 0.45 inches at Pocatello on the 23rd, 1.19 inches at Portland, 1.51 inches at Seattle, 2.01 inches at Olympia, and 2.61 inches at Astoria on the 26th, and 0.43 inches at Pendleton, 0.45 inches at Lewiston, 0.64 inches(tie) at Seattle, 0.88 inches at Spokane, and 1.17 inches at Portland on the 27th.

Temperature Summary

The 31 station temperature index for the Pacific Northwest departed +2.5 degrees from normal relative to the 1971-2000 normals. Mean temperature departures ranged from -3.1 to 8.3 degrees.

High temperature records broken in March included 61 at Wenatchee on the 4th, 61 at Wenatchee on the 5th, 57 at Kalispell, 65 at Wenatchee, 67(tie) at Olympia, 67 at Yakima, and 68 at Redmond OR on the 6th, 66 at Olympia , 69(tie) at Portland, 69 at Lewiston and

Pendleton, 71(tie) at Eugene, and 71 at Yakima on the 7th, 67 at Seattle, 68 at Boise and Wenatchee, 69 (tie) at Pendleton, 70(tie) at Yakima, 70 at Olympia, and 72(tie) at Portland on the 8th, 64 at Missoula, 70 at Portland and Redmond OR, and 72(tie) at Eugene on the 9th, 65(tie) at Wenatchee, 67 at Redmond OR, 68 at Pendleton, 69(tie) at Eugene, and 74 at Portland on the 10th, 65(tie) at Seattle, 65 at Kalispell, 68 at Wenatchee, 69 at Pendleton, 70 at Olympia, 72 at Eugene and Yakima, 73 at Salem, 75 at Portland, 76 at Redmond OR, and 80 at Medford on the 11th, 67(tie) at Astoria on the 12th, and 67 at Olympia on the 14th.

Low temperature records broken in March included 12 at Redmond OR and 25 at Olympia on the 14th.

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
